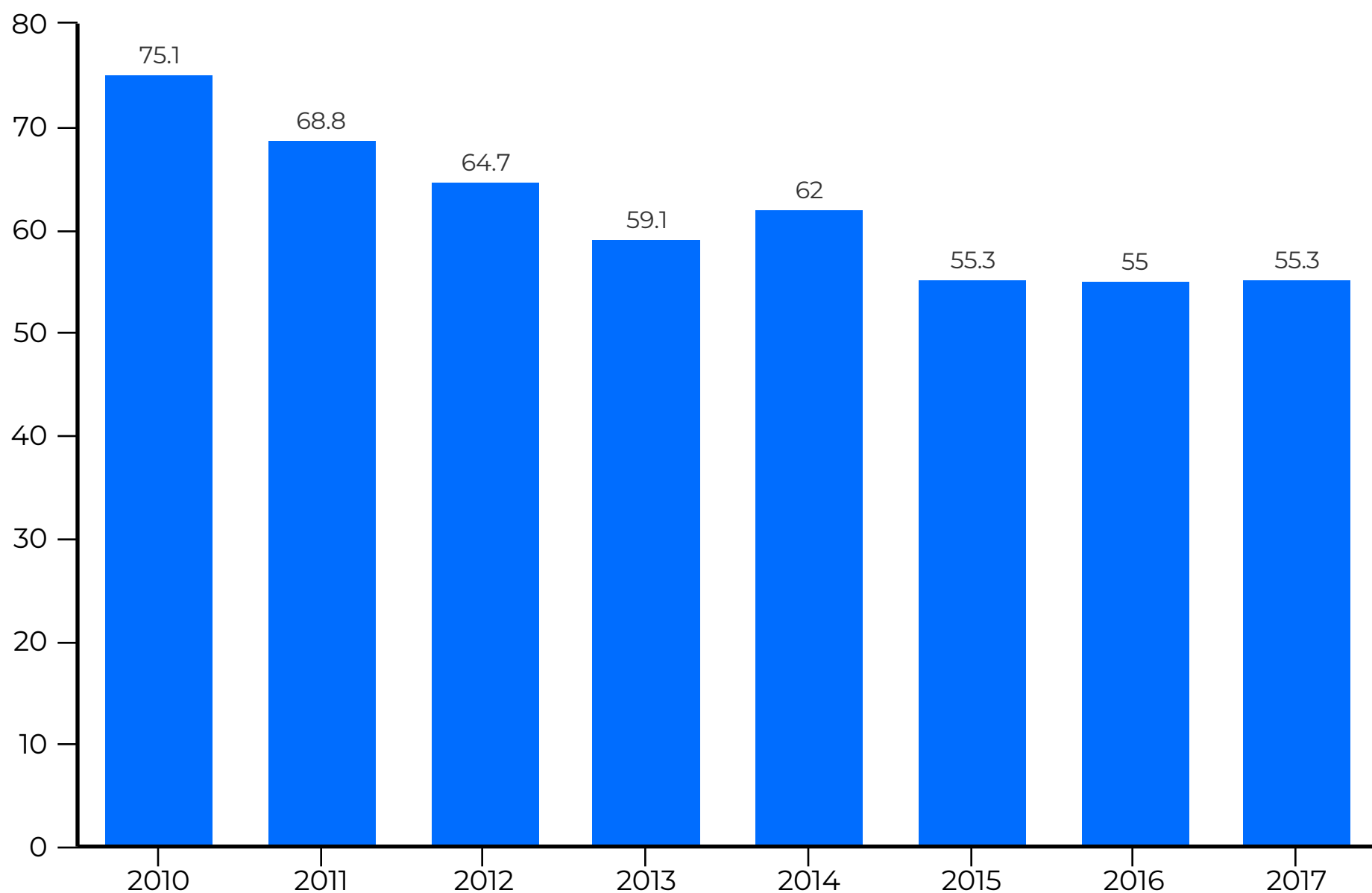


Views from the clinical audit community

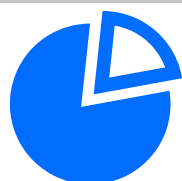
Why are more and more clinical audit professionals reporting that they plan to leave the discipline in the next 5 years?



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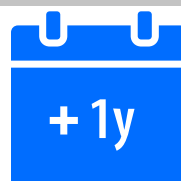
Background

Data is derived from the question: 'Do you still intend to work in clinical audit/or have responsibilities for clinical audit in five years time'? This is data reported anonymously from the clinical audit community. The survey is conducted every December and since its inception in 2010 over 100 respondents have taken part in all surveys (reaching a peak of n=218 in 2016). The majority of respondents classify themselves as 'clinical audit professional' and typically over 50% of respondents work in the acute sector.



More detail

When comparing feedback from the different groups of respondents those in Mental Health provided the most positive response with 59.3% answering 'Yes' followed by 56.8% from the acute sector.



Age factors

64% of respondents who had worked in audit 11-15 years answered 'Yes'. 44% who had worked in audit 16 years or more answered 'Yes' although it is more likely they will be nearer to retirement than others.
